cannot remember a time when I wasn't drawing. To be specific, drawing animals. To be really specific, drawing horses and dogs. I decided early on I was to be an artist, and I always identified myself as such.

Once it came time to go to college, I naturally went for an art curriculum at the American University in Washington, D.C. There my lack of self-discipline merged seamlessly with my lack of motivation (at the time) and combined with the typical teaching approach of most art schools, I lost interest and stopped after three semesters.
